I write a blog called 300wordsaday.com. If you are reading this, you know that already. Because this is the report of a project I started there.

You get up in the morning and read those 300 words. I stay up the evening before to write them.

We have a conversation, I suppose, about following Jesus. We started, some of us, 27 months ago. At the end of the first month, there were about 30 people between Mailchimp and Feedburner who subscribed to 300words. Now, there are about 400.

During the last week of April, 2011, I realized that I haven't asked you much about yourself. I've just been here talking. So I decided to learn a little about you with [a survey about the Bible](#). And more than 70 of you replied.

I suppose there is a lot of processing I could do, trying to correlate responses. But that wasn't what I wanted to do with the project. I wanted to have a better sense of who I am talking to, or, more accurately, what the people who are giving up some time to listen to me each day would like to know about.

So I'm publishing your responses in this way, as an unprocessed set of responses. There are no percentages, no linking of people who read this version with that kind of question. I don't see that as helpful for what I'm doing. About half of you listed email addresses, but I'm not going to tell you who.

Your questions are thoughtful and probing. I know that some of you have asked these questions of others and often. I'm guessing that some of you have never put them outside your head and heart. I am grateful.

Here's the challenge for me: I take the Bible seriously. I look at and for a narrative arc that runs from beginning to end. For example I love the fact that in the second chapter, God talks about marriage. In the next to last chapter, in the last big science fiction image in a science fiction-like book, we see marriage. It's a story that God tells all the way through, as a way to illustrate his love.

A few years ago, as I sat with the committee that would put Rev in front of my name, I was told that I see the big picture, I see how the pieces fit and flow. I like to think that everyone does, but that wouldn't be accurate. So I'll let you read through the responses. And I'll look for ways to explain, to illustrate, to see the big picture, to talk about the forest.

The question I struggle most with about the Bible is....

- I have loads of difficulty with the approach that the Bible is the inerrant word of God. It sometimes clouds my appreciation of people who are so convicted in that truth. Yet the whole truth is, that's not what it's all about (my judgment, that is.)
- NOT so much the Bible as a lot of smart people's interpretations about it. Why do so many smart people have different ideas about what it says??
- In the Old Testament, why did God lead the Israelites to devote to destruction so many people, including women and children?
- Most of it is too hard for me to understand and I don't get all the weird stuff in the first part.
- What happened during the life of Christ the years before His earthly ministry?
- I don't really have one.
- How God could forgive me, and why I do such a poor job of being forgiving.
- Why can't I learn from the mistakes of those I read about in the Bible? I know it's the fallen thing, but it is still a sad day when I let God or others down, or because I don't have the right view of things that I allow others around me or situations rob me of that joy.
- Why, in the OT, are the wives and children disciplined with the men who actually did the sinful act? Like in Joshua 7.

- How to stop struggling over what it means and how it works and simple concentrate on how I should respond to its truth. not jumping to conclusions based on small parts

It means I approach the Bible as a document from long ago, one that doesn't read anything like other stuff I read to enjoy.

- "Making sure I'm reading what God meant to say. Sometimes other translations take words and replace them with other words that don't have the meaning intended. So I am learning that certain words have different meanings. It makes entire scripture passages have completely new meanings if the words are translated correctly. So my biggest struggle is knowing what God really says sometimes."
- "The fear of God and some of the punishment God imposed That is not my God; my God is a loving, kind, slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love."

- I actually don't have any struggle as such. But Bible is better understood when you meditate a lot about what you've read as opposed to just reading it. So it's kinda struggle for me.

- Knowing the difference between cultural restrictions of the time that do and do not apply to us today.
- How to live the principles in today's world and serve as a vessel for God.
- "that it says we may not change it; and yet we are constantly finding new nuances of meaning that change everything (or not?) and it seems frustrating that it can be ""read""/ understood so many ways....
- the Biblical idea I struggle with most is predestination."
- Only one? I don't often find myself struggling with particular questions about the bible (that sounds way more cocky than intended), but more questions of application, especially in the context of avoiding a hypocritical legalism and instead pursuing a blind love that recognizes God's desire to see all of humanity returned to him. Much easier to discuss and conceptualize than to live out.
- It's veracity, and it's cultural irrelevance. The bible was written in a very, very different cultural time than the one we live in now. I really struggle with how to make the words

come to have meaning in this day and age.

- ...what was left out...books/writings that didn't make the current "BIBLE"
- What was meant by this statement when it was said to those people in those days in that language for that reason
- Not to take the Bible literally
- how much is 'cultural' - ie women covering their heads, no women in church leadership - and how much of that is literal? also the homosexuality issue.
- This is hard. I don't necessarily have "bible" questions as I do faith questions. Like, how do you explain to people when a small child dies, or a mom dies when she still has young children at home.
- Why non salvific items where included that have caused so much division. ie the middle of revelation.
- How to relate the historical context to today.
- how to live out what I already know to be true...
- Free will and predestination and the concept of God's foreknowledge not constituting predestined acts.
- It is not so much a struggle as it is a constant reminder that there is so much more to learn. I will never understand everything, so I keep reading. In doing that, I learn more every time I read the Bible with an open mind.
- Is there a literal, fiery hell.
- How much of it is really from the mouth of G-d and how much is from the hand of Man? (There is a Jewish prayer that we sing before we take the Torah out of the ark. It says, "This is the Torah, that Moses put before Israel, by the mouth of G-d, by the hand of Moses." Some rabbis interpret that to mean that the words of Torah always come through the lens of Moses' writing process - through his own humanity and frailty and errors -- and that part of our job in wrestling with Torah is to come to understand what is human in it and what is truly divine. This is not a fundamentalist approach, but it is the one I hold to.)
- I purposefully stayed away from the Bible for a couple years in order to wash myself from the presuppositions that had been baked into me when I was younger. So no problems at the moment. :)
- Contradictions between differing books.
- When do I take it literally, figuratively or etc...
- how to proclaim the good news with humility
- taking it literally, I just can't
- How to deal with the widely divergent interpretations of the Bible between the Evangelical and "Progressive" wings of the Christian church.
- probably finding the time to really read it. The problem isn't even finding the time, it's making the time and deciding to actually sit down and open God's Word. I pray that God will give me the strength to set other trivial things aside and spend time with the One Who holds the world (and my problems) in His hands.
- I know it's the inspired word of God. But I also know it's 30 or more different translations that don't all say the same thing in English and who knows which one is the best

translation of Hebrew/Greek/Aramaic, and which part of the Hebrew is based on the best oral version handed down? I'm coming down on that's all why it's so critical to know and understand it's a comprehensive whole, and that relying on a single line is risky, even if that single line is "I am THE way, truth and life." Yet I rely on that one anyway because it's in perfect harmony with all the rest.

What's your favorite story from the Bible?

- Either Pentecost or the stories of Esther, Ruth, Rahab and other strong women. Actually, I seem to like best the story that speaks to me in the moment...Job is good sometimes, other times its Paul's letters (though for years, I struggled with Paul as you've struggled with translations.)
- John 15. It is still changing my life
- Favorite as in most meaningful and important: the last week of Jesus' life, Crucifixion, and Resurrection--because I can't comprehend of Jesus loving me so much that He went through all that so I can spend eternity with Him and the Father and Holy Spirit.
- Favorites as in most enjoyable to read: Ruth, Esther, angel appearing to Mary and her willing acceptance
- Sorry I can't choose just one.
- Noah's ArK. I love the animals and how Noah followed his understanding of what God wanted him to do even tho it seemed bizarre to everyone else. I love that Noah saved all the animals all by himself because he believed what God was telling him.

- If I had to pick one on the spur of the moment (this morning), I might say Ruth, or Hosea's redemption of his wife, Nathan's confrontation of David, Jesus' three-fold confrontation of Peter, or the "prodigal son". But I don't look at it that way. I see the various stories, sayings, and events as threads in a tapestry that makes up one story that is too big to keep in my head all at once. My understanding of it grows by constantly, repeatedly tracing those threads, seeing how they intertwine, and what they tell me about God and about my own life.
